## Archetypal Cosmology: A New Mythic Perspective and Guide to Individuation

Keiron Le Grice is a professor of depth psychology in the Jungian and Archetypal Studies specialization at Pacifica Graduate Institute, California, and the author of several books, including *The Archetypal Cosmos*, *The Rebirth of the Hero*, and the forthcoming three-volume *The Way of the Archetypes*. He is also co-editor of *Jung on Astrology*, a compilation of Jung's writings on this topic. Keiron's work has been central to the development of the field of archetypal cosmology. He is a founder and former co-editor of *Archai: The Journal of Archetypal Cosmology*, now serving as senior editorial advisor, and in 2016 he co-founded the Institute of Transpersonal and Archetypal Studies (ITAS) with colleagues in the U.S. and the U.K. He lives in Ojai, California, with his wife and son.

She is also a Mindfulness teacher and has been a practitioner of Buddhism since 1971. Polly is the author or editor of eighteen books, which have been translated into more than twenty languages. Her most recent work book is *Love Between Equals: Relationship as a Spiritual Path* (Shambhala, 2019).

## Our history

In the early 1970s, an era of emerging social consciousness and individual exploration, fifty people responded to an ad placed by our founder, Dottie Kyle, in a small, local newspaper, *The Lake Oswego Review*. They gathered under a shade tree in her backyard to share ideas about Jungian psychology. They were hungry for discussion and community. Out of this gathering of seekers, Oregon Friends of Jung was born.

Before long, those early OFJ members began inviting leading Jungians to Portland as a way of nourishing themselves and serving the community. Programs with Joseph Campbell, James Hillman, Edward Edinger, Joseph Wheelwright, Marion Woodman, Thomas Moore, and Robert Johnson attracted attendees from around the state and beyond.

Now in our 47th year, Oregon Friends of Jung is a 300-member volunteer-driven 501(c)(3) non-profit educational organization, with an Executive Director and passionate Board. We remain conscious of the vision of our founders: to serve our community humbly and with few organizational trappings, offering serious Jungian discourse to individuals who are searching for consciousness and meaning in their personal lives and in the world.

### Towards a 21<sup>st</sup> Century Model of Psyche: Altered States, Oracles and Intelligences

JOSEPH CAMBRAY, PHD

In the nearly 50 years since C. G. Jung died, great strides in understanding of whole systems have occurred. It is now time to apply a holistic/systemic approach to a Jung's model of the psyche with the aim of contemporizing our views of the unconscious. In particular, we will look at how ecological formulations offer richer, more complex models of the psyche, revealing layers of the unconscious and a far more interconnected universe than previously imagined.

Continuing to develop and explore the themes of intelligences in nature and oracles, we will begin with an imaginal exercise based on the gateway affective experience of wonder. We will then return to exploring and deepening understandings of the intelligences involved, considering them from the perspective of the alchemical notion of the lumen naturae (the lights in nature). Possible links revealed by recent research have begun to reveal new understandings of ancient oracular traditions. Combining these threads, we will seek to appreciate an oracular dimension of nature at the foundation of our vision of the unconscious, and thus a basis for a revision and expansion of our sense of self.

### Another Whom We Do Not Know: Dreams as the Voice of the Inner Companion

Understanding dreams is difficult. Understanding our own dreams sometimes seems almost impossible. ### The Absent Father Effect On Daughters: Father Desire, Father Wounds

The absent father effect is an unrequired love story. The harm done due to the presence of the father's absence affects a daughter and her father, in body, mind, and soul. The father is an essential aspect of the psyche and significant for the daughter's psychological and physical life, both personally and culturally. The Friday talk focuses on the daughter- father relationship, its absence, symptoms and problems, as well as ways to repair it.

The workshop illuminates through a fairy tale and discussion the ramifications of identification with or ignorance of the absent father. Because a daughter does not appear in his vision, she receives no reflection from him. She is left to wonder about her value and if she is worthy of loving herself and others. She retains a hole in her heart, the threads of her personality ruptured. His absence may lead him to question what he wishes for her, and how he has damaged and limited her growth. Participants will have experiential opportunities to explore ways to repair the missing pieces. Both lecture and workshop apply to everyone, as the aspects of fathers and daughters are internal figures that appear in dreams and in all relationships.

### Persephone's Wake

CRAIG SAN ROQUE & MIRIAM PICKARD

This presentation radically reinterprets the Persephone myth. It comes out of a perspective that mixes Australian desert experience with old Mediterranean folklore and the harsh, confusing anxieties of the present time.

Friday's performance opens with extracts from *Persephone's Heart*, where she, as a 'serpentine original-creation being', takes human form and feeling. Then *Wake* reveals why Persephone leaves her body, refusing to return. Her husband, Hades, who in profound grief, attempts to revive her life-sustaining role, is desperately unhappy about how humans fail to take care of the integrity of earth's nature. Her daughter and son are left with a challenge to carry on and care for future cycles of generative life.

Through performance and presentation, visuals, discussion and reflection, we explore this psycho-mythological perspective. How can onto-poetic, reality-based stories clarify and strengthen our responses to environmental anxiety? How does the subjective experience of retelling the Persephone journey inspire and direct us?
